

Introducing Ros Black

We will be welcoming Ros Black back next year, this time for a talk on the Temperance Women. Here she is in her words:

Having taken early retirement from running a special needs housing and care charity and with 2 daughters having flown the nest, I finally had time to indulge my hobbies of history and writing. Living in Reigate, I discovered on my doorstep a fascinating story – that of Lady Henry Somerset, a Victorian temperance reformer and true humanitarian. My fascination with amazing women whose work has largely been forgotten had begun.



I wrote a biography Lady Somerset, reawakening interest in her, especially in Reigate. The story of Duxhurst, her 'farm colony for inebriate women' just a few miles south of Reigate also caught the imagination and I found I was asked to give talks to many local groups on these subjects. The story led me to uncover stories of her contemporaries especially temperance workers – an unusual subject for someone who likes the occasional glass of wine, I admit!

When I moved to Haywards Heath, almost 10 years ago, I pursued another Lady Henry link to Grace Kimmins who had established Chailey Heritage for disabled children in 1903. Lady Somerset and many members of her family had been Patrons to Grace's work. Chailey Heritage Foundation continues this work today and I am proud to support this through sales of my book *Grace Kimmins & her Chailey Heritage* and talk fees.

I enjoy sharing the results of my research, and my enthusiasm for the stories I have uncovered. I am also delighted at how willing people are to share their own recollections or memorabilia with me. I may have written books, but I've come to realise that the stories are never actually finished – there is always more to discover.

We look forward to hearing her talk - Scandal, Salvation and Suffrage - next May.

There is nothing quite like discovering and entering an underground space that was built or used or inhabited of sheltered in by people in the past. Just before lockdown, thanks to the efforts of a small group of fellow speleologists working

with the Friends of Deepdene, we were able to uncover and chart a number of forgotten chambers that once supplied water to the majestic Deepdene House.
